

A dynamic method of composing a photo – and which is more pleasing to the eye – is to have a diagonal line running through the photo, from corner to corner or from about 1/3 down from the top to 1/3 up from the

bottom.



Strong diagonal lines provide a sense of movement and speed, and add drama to a composition. A diagonal arrangement of the main subject appeals more to the eye than a perfectly horizontal or vertical placement. Our eyes naturally favor the non-traditional arrangement of lines.



The line could be a street, a fence rail, a road, a shoreline, etc. - anything which creates a line or division in the picture.



Whether the line rises or falls creates different feelings about the photo. If a line descends into the picture from top left to bottom right, something appears to be entering the picture – more positive feeling.




If the line rises from bottom left to top right, something appears to be leaving the picture – more negative feeling.



Use these concepts to create specific feelings in your photographs.



Diagonal Lines




Gives ACTION to a picture

CONTRAST in Size and Shape draws the eye to the truck which is the CENTER of INTEREST



































Assignment 2
